

BACKSTORY PREACHING

I recently completed the Backstory Preaching (BsP) program to become a lay preacher. BsP is an online ministry to assist lay and ordained preachers in sermon preparation and delivery. It was founded by The Rev. Dr. Lisa Cressman who has over 25 years of experience as an Episcopal

priest, spiritual director, and retreat leader. Dr. Cressman developed an approach to sermon preparation based on both spiritual depth and practical discipline and integrates life, prayer, and spirituality to communicate God's message.

BsP combines its sermon prep process with the practice of Lectio Divina:

- 1. Lectio (Read): The preacher reads the Scripture and attentively while paying attention to any phrases or verses that resonate with your life experiences or personal journey.
- 2. Meditatio (Meditate): After reading, the preacher reflects on the text and considers how it connects to their own backstory, struggles, joys and encounters with God.
- 3. Oratio (Pray): The preacher prays for God's guidance in understanding the text and for the ability to share it authentically with the congregation.
- 4. Contemplatio (Contemplate): In this phase, the preacher merges the Scripture and their own personal experience to enhance the message they want to convey. The goal is to share heartfelt truths and not just intellectual insights.

With the insights gained from Lectio Divina, the preacher then crafts the sermon bridging the gap between the Scriptures and contemporary life to foster a sense of community and shared faith journey.

As part of the ministry, each member of the cohort prepared a sermon on Lent 2 Year B (February 25, 2024.) After selecting the scriptural text for the sermon, we followed the process of Lectio Divina and crafted our

sermons. At the conclusion of the 6-week classes for ministry on February 22, 2024, we preached our sermons to the cohort.

Participating in the BsP ministry was an inspirational and joyous experience for which I am eternally grateful to The Rev. Dr. Fred Moser for asking me to consider being a lay preacher.

NOTES FROM THE VESTRY

The Trinity vestry met on Thursday February 22nd. We welcomed two new members to the vestry - Christine Faris and Wendy Eberhart. We also elected Jim Jarvis as Junior Warden for the upcoming year. Christine, Wendy and Jim will be our Convention Delegates for the fall diocesan convention.

We reviewed the Parochial Report being sent to the Diocese which includes a summary of participation and programs of the past year. We also spent time on the Budget for 2024. There were a number of changes that needed to be made reflecting the change in Fred's position, a change in our cleaning service contract, building repairs needed for both the church and the rectory and planning for a part time Office Assistant. We were able to put back into the budget monies for ministries such as Outreach that have not been funded in recent years. The revised budget will be presented at an upcoming parish community meeting in March. The vestry voted to accept this budget for the upcoming year.

We resumed work on Ministry such as Pastoral Care, Stewardship and Finance, Buildings and Grounds, Liturgy and Worship, Children's Ministry and Outreach. Vestry members each took an area of interest and will invite others to join as we move toward constellation with other parishes.

Jim Jarvis gave a report on long term building issues and possible funding. We will discuss this in more depth at our next meeting in March.

TALES FROM THE RECTORY

Things are progressing nicely in the rectory, as our Congolese friends get settled into their routines, and we shake out the impact of a few unoccupied years.

You'll see a new storm door at the entrance, along with safety railings on that patio and stairs, and a rain gutter to control runoff and icing.

We had two no-heat reports in February. One was caused by "kid" fingers messing with the thermostat. The other was a failure of the last unreplaced sub-assembly in the heating plant, now replaced. A final check of the burner and systems says A-OK.

On top of that, the clothes dryer stopped working on the 22nd. The belt between the motor and the dryer drum had broken. Roger Marcotte responded and fixed it in a day's time.

Yay for local vendors!

In general, we've remediated all systems. Two windows in the second-floor bedrooms were replaced with fire-code compliant escapes. All fire alarms were replaced with new, and escape ladders are in each of the second-floor bedrooms. The new windows need drapes, but the US Committee on Refugees and Immigrants believes they have them.

Still remaining to do: Replacement of the ice shield on the east side of the rectory roof, and new rain gutters on that wall. In addition, improving drainage around ground level basement windows, and basement doors. Most of this will wait until Spring.

Over the past month the group explored stories from Jesus's ministry including Jesus feeding the five thousand and the parable of the lost sheep, played various games, and participated in crafts such as creating picnic baskets, decorating fish cookies, and diving into a design challenge to make sheep out of a smorgasborg of materials. The children decorated an Alleluia Banner, and

on Shrove Tuesday some of the kiddos hid the banner in a secret location in the church. We can look forward to seeing it on Easter! The kids have hidden it well, and will present it on Easter Sunday. (The congregation won't have to look for it.) A source involved in the hiding told me, "It might be hard to find, I think it would take sooooo long, but maybe we could do "hot and cold to help them."

I record the hymns on my computer using Logic Pro X, and edit videos with Final Cut Pro.



RECIPE of the MONTH

MAPLE PUDDING CAKE

From an Old Vermont Cookbook

What You Need:

1 ½ cups unbleached flour 2 teaspoons baking powder ¾ cup white or maple sugar ¾ cup milk

1/4 teaspoon salt 1 1/2 cups pure maple syrup 3/4 cup water 2 tablespoons butter

How to Do IT:

Preheat oven to 350° F. Combine flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Stir in milk. Spread batter in an 8" or 9" greased baking pan or dish. Combine syrup, water and butter in a saucepan and heat until butter is melted. Stir to combine. Gently pour the heated liquid over the batter in the pan and bake about 45 minutes until the cake is lightly browned. The maple syrup mixture will sink to the bottom where it forms a pudding-like sauce. Cool briefly, and top with whipped cream or ice cream.
